Mission Australia gave me gifts for each of my children and a roll of wrapping paper. They said I could tell them that they were from me. I can't believe someone would do this for me. This has changed the lives of my family and my children's memories of Christmas forever. I was able to be a mum and give to my children at this most blessed time of year. We have a young person who has just started her HSC year. She is the carer for her mum who has significant mental health and physical issues and cannot leave the house. She also cares for her baby brother and two little sisters. When asked how she normally celebrates Christmas, her response was that they don't because they can't afford a tree or anything to put under it. She was able to select some gifts for her mum, her sisters, her baby brother and her grandfather. She was quite overwhelmed. Phil, Sydney

The gifts themselves were great, but what we treasured most was the feeling it gave us. We had forgotten that good things can happen. You restored our faith. Family of four, Queensland

One of my clients is a grandmother. She broke down when we gave her gifts for her grandson. She'd been trying to work out which bill not to pay in order to be able to buy him something. She'd even thought about stealing something from the local shopping centre - she'd never stolen anything in her life. It was heartbreaking to think that this sweet and caring lady had almost been driven to such desperate measures. Dave, Perth

One of our clients is a 15-year old who often has to care for his mum who has depression and his brother who has learning difficulties. His mum was retrenched from her job two weeks before Christmas. The whole family was in tears when asked to choose gifts from the Wishing Tree. Claire, Victoria

Homelessness can happen to anyone

Smart and articulate, Matthew is not a drug addict, alcoholic, long-term unemployed or any of the numerous tags that society bolts on to the homeless

I had everything. I'd worked for a courier company for 14 years, then ran a successful landscape gardening business on the north shore. I was financially secure, living in Pymble with my partner, Kylie.

In the past Kylie had issues with gambling. I'd spent \$110 a day for her to go to rehab in Melbourne. She was doing really well and I was proud of her. But one day, I tried to use my credit cards and couldn't access any funds. She'd spent \$260,000 on poker machines. I don't know why. Maybe she felt lonely. Maybe she was bored.

I lost everything - my car, my house, my furniture, even my cat. I lost my mates and my social life. And of course I lost Kylie. She took everything besides my sanity.

I went from having everything to sleeping on cardboard in Hyde Park. I had to cover the sprinklers with plastic bags so I could get some rest.

I felt numb and lost. I had no shoes for three months and ended up with a bone spur. I didn't have any clothes with me because it was too hard to carry them.

Food wasn't a problem. People were so generous. I met some really nice people who would stop and see how I was going and not overlook me.

The worst parts are the loneliness and lack of friendship.

When you're in that situation you live one moment at a time...just surviving.

There are a lot of people like me on the street. You'd be surprised, people who were successful and lost everything.

I tried to get help, but it was really hard. I caught a train out to a hostel in Parramatta, but the dormitory I was put in was full of people who'd just got out of jail. They suggested I contact Mission Australia who referred me to Housing NSW.

I've been living in my own place for six weeks now. I'm so grateful I just want to put back into the community. Thank you so much for your hospitality and the kindness you've shown me.

Standing together

Matthew was referred to me by our counsellor. When I sat down to listen to his story, he was still on the streets. For me, it was about keeping hope alive

for Matthew. He knew from others on the streets how long it could take to get housing. I said to him, "I'll stay with you until things get better." It was really important to him that I would listen to him and be there for him for as long as he needed me.

A home with heart

An estimated 1 in 5 people experiencing homelessness are over the age of 55. In Orange, there are people sleeping in drainage ditches or rubbish compacters just to keep warm during the cold, harsh winters, so there's a real need for our newest 60-bed, aged-care facility, Benjamin Short Grove. Modelled on our award-winning Annie Green Court and Charles Chambers Court, construction began in April and is expected to take around 12 months.



The destructive force ravaging our youth

Australia is facing an ice epidemic and a lack of youth-focused treatment services is leaving many families feeling helpless

Ice ruins lives. It consumes the addict.

And it consumes everyone around them. Because of its potency, many users experience a range of significant physical and psychological health problems, including psychosis, paranoia, aggression and impaired memory. Ice is increasingly infiltrating regional communities across Australia. With limited detoxification, counselling, rehabilitation and followup services for young addicts, ice is putting an entire generation at risk.

ice hell - a mother and son's journey

Jane, a newsagent from Northern Queensland, only found out about her son Will's ice addiction when he was expelled from his private school aged 15. She contacted rehab centres across the state, but Will was either too young, too old or their waiting lists were too long.

Will's life unravelled. He left home and overdosed at 17. When the family GP was unable to get Will into rehab, Jane had no choice but to help him detox at home. After receiving threats from Will's drug world associates, Jane had no choice but to take matters into her own hands. She put her ice-addicted son into her car and drove along the east coast of Australia until Will was accepted into Triple Care Farm's 12-week residential drug and alcohol program.

Will is now clean and his life is back on track. Jane knows that, unlike many young Australians, Will is one of the lucky ones.




